MoMI presents in collaboration with IFC Films: "Clayography in Motion: Adam Elliot's *Memoir of a Snail*," an installation of puppets from the Golden Globe–nominated film, and an interactive make-your-own-animation experience for visitors

Opening December 20, as part of the Museum's core exhibition *Behind the Screen*, which explores the creative process in film and television

Astoria, New York, December 17, 2024 — Beginning December 20 and running through March 2025, Museum of the Moving Image (MoMI) will present *Clayography in Motion: Adam Elliot's* Memoir of a Snail, a new exhibit in celebration of the critically acclaimed 2024 stop-motion animated film, *Memoir of a Snail,* recently nominated for a Golden Globe and a Critics Choice Award for Best Animated Feature. The installation will include a variety of handmade puppets exclusively from the film, presented alongside film excerpts, as well as 2-D characters and film sets that visitors can use to create their own stop-motion animations at MoMI's interactive stations. This new installation will "take over" the animation section of the Museum's dynamic core exhibition *Behind the Screen*.

From Academy Award®-winning writer and director Adam Elliot, *Memoir of a Snail* is a heartfelt and hilarious chronicle of the life of Grace Pudel (Sarah Snook), an outsider finding her confidence and silver linings amongst the clutter of everyday life.

As in previous work from Elliot, *Memoir* uses clay puppets to explore themes inspired by the filmmaker's own life. "Clayography," a term coined by Elliot to describe his work, merges clay animation and biography.

*Memoir of a Snail* premiered earlier this year at the Annecy International Animation Film Festival, where it won the Cristal Award for a Feature Film. The film was released in the U.S. by IFC Films on October 25 and is currently available everywhere you rent or buy movies.

On January 3 and 4, the Museum will also present a related screening series, featuring *Memoir of a Snail*, Elliot's earlier feature *Mary and Max* (2009), and five shorts including his Oscar-winning *Harvie Krumpet* (2004)—with Elliot attending in person.

MoMI has presented numerous exhibitions devoted to animation. These have included *Tim Burton: Drawings* (2003), *Gumby and the Art of Stop-Motion Animation* (2005), *The Art of Rise of the Guardians* (2012), *What's Up, Doc? The Animation Art of Chuck Jones* (2014), *Plymptoons: Short Films and Drawings by Bill Plympton* (2014), *The World of Anomalisa* (2015), *Reimagining the Cel: Experiments in Animation from the 1980s* (2019), *D'Oh! Animating America's Favorite Family* (2020), *"A Wonderful, Awful Idea": Animating the Grinch Who Stole Christmas* (2021), and *LAIKA: Life in Stop Motion* (2022–23). In addition, the Museum's core exhibition *Behind the Screen*, which explores the many crafts and creative processes behind moving images, has a section devoted to animation and its link to the birth of cinema.
