February at MoMI: Celebrating Black History Month, Oscarthemed Snubbed Forever series, Mini Retro Game Jam for teens, Welcome Ramadan Celebration

The Museum will be open Monday, February 17, 12:00-6:00, for Presidents' Day

Astoria, New York, January 29, 2025 — This February, Museum of the Moving Image will honor Black History Month with films by pioneers of African American cinema and host community partner Afrikan Poetry Theatre's annual Black History Month Film Festival; present the 21-film screening series Snubbed Forever, featuring performances by actors who were never nominated for an Academy Award for acting; and host a conversation and book signing with MIT scholar Peter Kaufman on the publication of *The Moving Image: A User's Manual*; among other events.

Starting February 1, and every Saturday through April 19, the Museum is bringing back <u>free Access Mornings</u> for families with autistic children to visit the Museum before public hours to explore galleries and participate in educator-led activities. Registration is recommended; light breakfast is included. This program is funded by the J.E. & Z.B. Butler Foundation.

MoMI's Education department will also host a free three-day Mini Retro Game Jam, February 18–20, during Midwinter recess for NYC public schools. This free program is open to teens ages 14–19; no experience necessary, but registration is required (space is limited). Learn more here.

Among community programs, the Museum's Neighborhood Council will present a free talk with local artist Talisa Almonte on February 1 and host its annual Welcome Ramadan Celebration on February 23, a day of fun programming for all ages, including a screening of *An Act of Worship* with director Nausheen Dadabhoy in person for a panel discussion. MoMI community partner Afrikan Poetry Theatre will present their annual Black History Month Film Festival on February 22, preceded on February 15 by a free networking event for NYC-based filmmakers.

Among current exhibitions, the Museum is pleased to announce the extension of *Recording the Ride: The Rise of Street-Style Skate Videos* exhibition through March 2 (originally on view through Jan. 26). In addition, *Memoir of a Snail*, from director Adam Elliot, the subject of the exhibition *Clayography in Motion*, on view through March 30, was just nominated for an Academy Award for Best Animated Feature. On the Schlosser Media Wall, the Community Curation series continues with Rodell Warner's *World Is*

Turning through February 2; Ceren Su Çelik's *Inhabiting the Threshold* (2024) will be on view from February 6–March 2.

Leading into Valentine's Day, the Museum continues with its <u>Friday Date Night</u> special offer: a \$50 pass includes admission for two guests, plus a complimentary coffee or drink (for two) at Mon Amour cafe in the Museum lobby, a discount on the popular Museum flipbook, and the option of attending the evening screening—available every Friday, through February 14. The screening on Friday, February 14 is *Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind*.

Pioneers of African American Cinema

February 1-23

Kino Lorber's collection brings together digitally restored versions of films from the early 20th century that were categorized as "race films." These movies, which were financed, produced, created, and distributed by Black Americans, were an essential part of the film landscape from the silent era through to the 1940s. Providing insight into a too-often unstudied and misunderstood chapter of American history, these truly innovative films had for years only been available in scarce, low-quality 16mm prints. Titles: *Within Our Gates* (dir. Oscar Micheaux), *Symbol of the Unconquered* (Micheaux), *The Flying Ace* (dir. Richard E. Norman), and *Eleven P.M.* (dir. Richard Maurice). Series info

February 1-March 9

MoMI's annual anti-tribute to the Oscars highlights those films and figures who have never won the little golden guy. This year, we focus on those iconic performers who somehow never had (or have, so far) received a single Academy Award nomination for acting. From major stars to unforgettable character actors, we offer our recurring Snubbed series for the chance to celebrate these enduring screen presences in some of their greatest roles. An educator, publisher, and producer, MIT's Peter Kaufman visits MoMI for a book signing and free conversation about his new publication *The Moving Image: A User's Manual* (MIT Press). Video is today's most popular information medium. Two-thirds of the world's internet traffic is video. Americans get their news and information more often from screens and speakers than through any other means. *The Moving Image* delves into how we have arrived here, offering the first definitive manual to help writers, educators, and publishers use video more effectively. Drawing on decades of experience, Kaufman presents new tools, best practices, and community resources for integrating film and sound into media that matters.

The Museum's core exhibition explores how moving images are made, marketed, and shown and features more than 1,400 objects from the MoMI collection, integrated with audiovisual material and computer-based interactive experiences. The latest addition, *Clayography in Motion*, which highlights the film *Memoir of a Snail* by Adam Elliot—recently nominated for the Academy Award for Best Animated Feature—features original puppets from the film and interactive stations where visitors can create their own short animations using 2D cutouts of characters.
