"Muppet Babies Take MoMI presented by Bank of America" offers fun activities for families on June 21 and 22

Newly restored puppets, including three Muppet Babies, will be on view at Museum of the Moving Image during a weekend of family-friendly activities

Astoria, New York, June 4, 2025 — As part of its Open Worlds 2025 free community programs, on June 21 and 22, Museum of the Moving Image will host "Muppet Babies Take MoMI presented by Bank of America," a weekend of fun and educational activities for families, anchored by the exhibition of newly restored puppets, including Muppet Babies puppets of Kermit the Frog, Baby Gonzo, and Baby Rowlf, in the Museum lobby. Visitors are invited to take photos with the puppets, participate in hands-on workshops, listen to live music from John Koozin and the Neighborhood, attend a panel discussion with Jim Henson's Creature Shop about puppet conservation, and more!

"We are so grateful to have Bank of America's support to preserve these historic puppets," said Barbara Miller, the Museum's Deputy Director for Curatorial Affairs. "We're delighted to present them to the public during this fun weekend, and to share the story of MoMl's ongoing collaboration with Jim Henson's Creature Shop. "

To help preserve important artifacts and works of art for future generations of museumgoers, Bank of America partners with cultural institutions in New York City and beyond to support conservation efforts. In partnership with the bank, the Museum turned to Jim Henson's Creature Shop to restore ten puppets from its extensive collection of artifacts related to the career of legendary puppeteer and filmmaker Jim Henson. The restored puppets include those made for innovative television commercials and variety show appearances in the early 1960s; several characters from *The Muppet Show* (1976–1981) including Camilla the Chicken; and three Muppet Babies, which first appeared in a flashback scene in *The Muppets Take Manhattan* (1984). During the restoration process, the puppets were cleaned, given mounts to prepare them for exhibition, and had foam replaced to ensure they remain physically stable. None of these puppets have been in the public eye for decades; this initiative will enable visitors to explore Henson's legacy and delightfully unique body of work.

"Museum of the Moving Image is one of our city's treasures, and partnering with it to share the newly restored Muppet Babies and the magic of Jim Henson's beloved characters with families and visitors of all ages is a true joy," said Connie Verducci, market executive, Bank of America New York City. "The Muppets' place in history and their emotional connection to so many underscores the importance of conserving meaningful pieces of our cultural past."

In its grand Redstone Theater, the Museum will also present matinee screenings of *The Muppets Take Manhattan* (1984), which features the Muppet Babies in their feature-film debut. In addition, visitors can visit *The Jim Henson Exhibition* in the Museum's galleries (paid admission required), to see more than 50 puppets on view from every phase of Henson's career.
